## HIV IN GEORGIA, BY THE NUMBERS:<sup>1</sup>



**51,350:** the number of Georgians living with diagnosed HIV in 2016.



**2nd in the nation:** in HIV diagnosis rates in 2017.



**5th in the nation:** in the number of HIV deaths in 2016.



**5th in the nation:** in HIV prevalence rates in 2016.

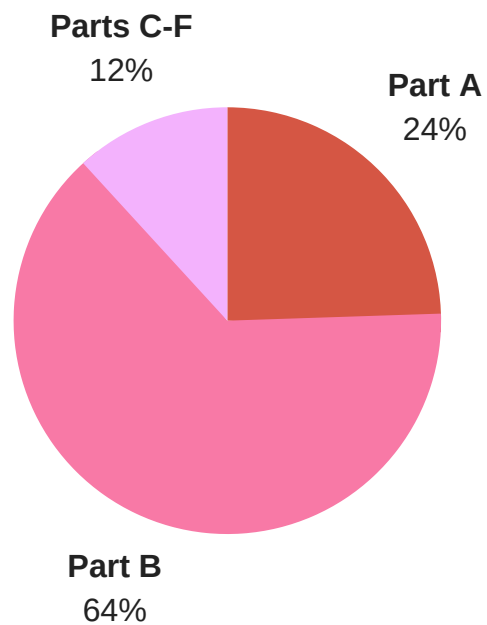


## DEPENDS ON RYAN WHITE:<sup>2</sup>

- An estimated **22,215 Georgians** received services through Ryan White in 2015.
- **66.6%** were living at or below the poverty line.
- Since Ryan White is legally required to be the "payer of last resort," these people did not have other access to medical or support services.

## Federal Ryan White Funding in GA<sup>3</sup>

- Part A: \$26.35M
- Part B: \$68.63M
- Part C: \$10.95M
- Part D: \$1.70M
- Part F: \$0.04M



## Georgia received **\$107.69 million** in Ryan White funds in 2018

- **\$37.63 million** went to the AIDS Drug Assistance Program (ADAP).
- Over the past five years, annual funding increased by **18%**.
- The **Ending HIV Epidemic: Plan for America** would increase funding to Cobb, DeKalb, Fulton, and Gwinnett counties.

# RYAN WHITE WORKS!

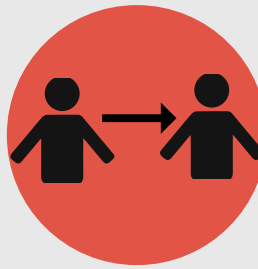
Ryan White services keep HIV-positive individuals in treatment and care



With treatment, people with HIV can live active, healthy lives.



People whose virus is suppressed for 6 months cannot transmit HIV through sex.



But, if disconnected from care, resistance to medications can develop making it easier to transmit HIV. Moreover, without treatment HIV is deadly.<sup>4</sup>

## HIV CARE CONTINUUM:

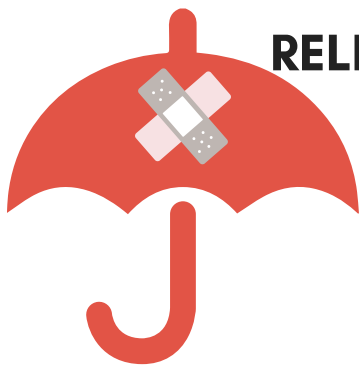
THE SERIES OF STEPS A PERSON WITH HIV TAKES FROM INITIAL DIAGNOSIS THROUGH THEIR SUCCESSFUL TREATMENT WITH HIV MEDICATION



While only **60%** of people nationwide have a viral load that is effectively suppressed as of 2015,<sup>5</sup> **85.9%** of HIV-positive clients who had received at least one Ryan White funded medical care visit have achieved viral suppression.<sup>6</sup>



**WITHOUT MEDICAID EXPANSION, GEORGIA RELIES ON RYAN WHITE MORE THAN OTHER STATES.**



**9,913** Ryan White program clients living with HIV in Georgia had no insurance coverage other than Ryan White in 2015.<sup>7</sup>

No other program provides the same set of gap-filling services or care as Ryan White. Even after health reform, **Ryan White remains crucial for Georgia.**
